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#### Message from the Founder Director

The year 2019-2020 was an eventful year. In April, 2019 there were two Art exhibitions one at the Indian Museum and another at the Asiatic Society where the artwork of our students and trainees were displayed. People of different walks of life The Asiatic Society graciously allowed us to celebrate the five years of YAAR in their Salt Lake campus.

A book on 'Understanding Autism Through the lens of Parents and Professionals' edited by Dr. Subir Dutta and Dr. Mitu De was published by The Asiatic Society. We hope many people will become aware of autism as the publications of The Asiatic Society have a wide reach.

The Calcutta Tramways Company arranged for a tram ride for individuals with autism and their families in April, 2019. What a glorious way to spread Autism Awareness in the month of April, which is the World Autism Awareness Month (WAAD).

It was in this year that Samaj Sebi Sangha, a well known Durga Puja Committee of Kolkata came forward with the proposal of making Autism Society West Bengal their Social partner. Our students, teachers and members were invited to the 'Khuti Puja', Rakhi celebration, Independence day and Durga Puja celebration.

During Durga Puja some of our students of the Dikshan unit staged a fashion show with ramp walk. Other Dikshan students and Aarohan trainees staged a short skit on Durga Puja. Samaj Sebi Sangha gave an impetus to our autism awareness program.

During this financial year some staff, members have been invited as resource persons both within India and abroad. ASWB has also organized a number of free workshops. Outreach programs have been initiated in Jhargram and Nityaberia, Nazat, 24 Parganas (South).

In our school we endeavour to organise all events that are found in a mainstream school. Of course we have reasonable accommodations in place. So we had our Annual Concert in May where three self advocates co hosted the program along with a special educator. Rabindra Jayanti, Independence Day, Rakhi Utsav, Children's day, Christams, Saraswati Puja, Holi were all celebrated in school. The Summer Camp was great fun. Picnic and annual Sports were held in Jan, 2020.

The lockdown in March, 2020 and pandemic will surely change the way we function. We closed our school in March, 2020 when the Honourable Chief Minister issued a notification. Then the Prime Minister of India declared a nationwide lockdown. We understand that we will have to face this new situation calmly with fortitude. We hope all our staff, members, parents and well wishers will stand by us during the times of COVID-19.

#### **Our Logo**



Our logo is made of puzzle pieces of different sizes and shape yet they all fit together. We believe in neuro-diversity. We believe that difference can work together to form a cohesive and just society. We need to understand and accept each other differences. Supporting each other difference and celebrating each other's strengths.

In isolation a single puzzle piece maybe interpreted differently by different people. To some, the symbol may be simply a reflection of the idea that autism spectrum disorders are puzzles that have not yet been solved. To others, the single puzzle piece may reflect that children who have autism are themselves pieces of the puzzle that do not fit in. To others still it could represent the mechanical nature of an ASD individual's thought process.

A nonprofit parent initiated organization started in 2002 to promote the support and inclusion of individuals with Autism Spectrum Disorder in society.

#### **Autism Society West Bengal's Vision**

A supportive, social environment where persons with Autism are understood and their right to participation upheld.

#### **Autism Society West Bengal's Mission**

To enable individuals with Autism and their families to participate in developing strategies to improve their quality of life; optimize their strength through education, advocacy and support.

#### **Autism Society West Bengal Overview**

The organization started when a group of parents felt the need to qualitatively improve the lives of Autistic individuals and their families. In Dec 2002, ASWB began as a parent support group with 4 parents and 3 individuals (who were related to individuals with autism), with the focus on intervention techniques for autistic children, and raising awareness about Autism. ASWB was registered in December 2002.

Dikshan the special school for students with autism was started in 2003. In 2009 a section for older student started focusing on work and life skills. The Parent Training wing ASPIRES (Autism Spectrum Intervention Research Education and Support), started in the year 2008 with three parents. Since the number of parents looking to be trained has increased to about 12 families per training. Soon the early Intervention unit started providing school readiness program to young kids with autism. A one month parent training program started this year in 2019 for parents who could not get leave from office or had other difficulties for a three month long course.

We believe that young individuals with Autism need a platform to share their views and meet with their peers. In order to provide them with this platform we started YAAR (Young Adults With Autism Reach Out), a social club in the year 2014. We also had 5 year celebration of the club in the prestigious Asiatic Society campus in Salt Lake. ASWB always strives for supporting individuals with Autism to reach their full potential. The soft skill training program is an

initiation in that direction which started in the 2017. Over the years we have added new programs in our school so that the students get a rich and diverse experience.

Autism Society West Bengal (ASWB) creates awareness about the day-to-day issues faced by individuals with autism spectrum, and their families. We advocate for appropriate services for individuals across their lifespan, and provide information regarding management, education, research, and advocacy. We conduct several awareness campaigns, workshops and seminars and in house trainings throughout the year. Special walks, art exhibitions and Programs are held on 2<sup>nd</sup> April (WAAD) each year to increase the awareness in the general public. In April 2019 a book 'Understanding Autism' was published by The Asiatic Society and co edited by our Secretary.

To create awareness at all levels ASWB has been partnering with different mainstream schools, university colleges, corporate houses, different national and international organizations to reach out to more and more people in the society regarding Autism on one hand. In 2019 we had the privilege of being the social partner of Samaj Sebi Sangha, a well known Durga Puja Committee of Kolkata.

#### **Organizational Profile**

Autism Society West Bengal is a parent-directed NGO. ASWB believed in open door policy so we encourage parents to actively participate in child's development process and share their feedback about the same. This helps us to ensure delivery of quality care and services to individuals with autism and their families. The organization has clear structures and open channels of communication between management and staff as well as with the beneficiaries and their families resulting in developing appropriate and suitable strategies to design programs for the beneficiaries. Equal opportunity for decision-making is reflected in the ways of working at Autism Society West Bengal. A team of highly dedicated, efficient professionals and active volunteers remain a source of strength and support, which will help us to reach our goals.

# **Autism awareness programs**

#### **Objective:**

- To create awareness about Autism
- To showcase the talents individuals with Autism have
- To make them part of mainstream society

Our aim is empowerment with knowledge. With this aim, we organize different awareness programmes in collaboration with Government departments, shopping malls, mainstream schools, corporate houses etc. Some of the awareness events are:

a. **Awareness walk** – Awareness Walk for Autism is organized every year on World Autism Awareness day (2<sup>nd</sup> April). Every year all the students, teachers, staff, parents and

- volunteers take part in this awareness walk which usually takes place in the centre of the city. We also invite celebrities and other distinguished guests. This year too on 2<sup>nd</sup> April, 2019 there was a autism Awareness walk.
- b. A -shadharan Since 2015, we have been organizing 'A -shadharan' an art exhibition by individuals with Autism. The main aim of the event is to bring out and speak about the talent individuals with Autism have. We have been fortune enough to have collaborated with ITC Sonar, Victoria Memorial Hall and Gaganendra Pradharshanshala for the event. This year in April, 2019 'A -shadharan' an art exhibition was held in collaboration with the Indian Museum. We were fortunate to have another collaboration in April, 2019 with The Asiatic Society. A 4 day art exhibition of the artwork of Dikshan students and 4 artists of the Aarohan unit was held in the Asiatic Society campus in Salt Lake.
- c. Daan Utsav Autism Society West Bengal have been a part of Daan Utsav India's Joy Of Giving festival since 2013. We have an ongoing partnership with Apeejay School and ITC Limited since 2014 where we put up tree full of wishes of the individuals with Autism in the form of teaching learning materials, stationery items used in the classroom, items used for making art and craft items, food items which help as reinforcers etc.
- d. **Flash Mob Dance** Autism Society West Bengal performed 1<sup>st</sup> Flash Mob dance at Quest Mall on 2<sup>nd</sup> may, 2014. Students, teachers and parents all participated in the dance to create awareness about Autism. Flash mob dance has been a part of awareness programme at IBM the 2015 and also as part of Autism Awareness Walk in 2018.
- e. **Sit and draw programe** Students from Dikshan, the special school run by Autism Society West Bengal also takes part every year in Apeejay Anand Library Art Mela since 2015. This year too students participated.
- f. **Cultural Programs**: Some students took part in the cultural Program organized by the Paschim Banga Rajya Pratibandhi Sammeleni. This year, in 2019 students took part in Rakhi Utsav and Durga Puja celebrations of Samaj Sebi Sangha as their social partner.
- g. **Exhibitions** Autism Society West Bengal also takes part in exhibitions cum sale of the handicrafts prepared by the students at pre vocational unit 'Aarohan'. We have participated in exhibitions held at Gokhale Memorial school in 2016. We also took part on science exhibition held at Heritage Institute of Technology in 2016 and 2017.
- h. **Paper presentations**: In few national and International Conferences papers have been presented. This year papers were presented by Director, 2 staff members, 3 Board members and 1 life Member,
- i. Paper publication: Research papers have been published on a regular basis.

# **ASWB Programmes & Activities**

#### Counseling

#### **Objectives**

- ➤ To assess and diagnose child and suggest the most suitable intervention program for the child.
- Counseling the families to accept the diagnosis.

It is the main point of interaction or rather the first point of interaction with the individual and his/her family. Clinical Psychologist examines the child and try to investigate the problem area and how to work on it. It also include diagnosis, assessment, functional assessment as suggested by some schools, cognitive behavioural therapy for individuals, medical therapy etc

Beneficiaries: 284 individuals have been counseled.

#### • Early Intervention School Readiness Programme

#### **Objectives:**

- To prepare individuals for mainstream schooling
- Developing social skill, classroom behaviour

The programme will develop communication and enhance emotional and social abilities of the child. This will enable the child to learn from his /her environment. Through individual assessment, the child's strengths and areas where he/she may need support will be realised. The purpose of this programme is for the child to go into mainstream school with whatever support the child may require. Most of the kids coming to this unit are in the age group of 2 to 6 years. Some of the individuals attending our Early Intervention programme have been successful in getting into mainstream schools. This unit meets the educational and social-emotional needs of young children diagnosed with Autism through structured preschool classrooms, behavioural services, Individualized Program Plans (IEP) and Yoga.

Beneficiaries: 35 individuals from this unit got admission in mainstream schools.

# Parent Training Unit Objectives:

- Empowering parents about intervention programmes to ensure that the learning process continues even after the programme gets over.
- To develop simple skills of an individual with Autism like eating habits, toilet training, imitation skills, play skills and communication skill.
- Creating awareness about Autism.

We believe that parents play an important part in child's life and parents of children with Autism are integral part of their child's educational programme. The parent training empowers parent with knowledge and skills. It enables the parents to take charge of their child's learning programmes and prepare them to advocate for their child in the mainstream. We welcome both parents to attend this program. We have also had incidents of grandparents attending. The program runs over 12 weeks period and starts each March, July and November. It uses research based teaching methods *viz.* ABA/VBA and TEACCH. A group of 8-10 parents are trained together with their children under the guidance of experienced trained therapists. The

program focuses on one-to-one intervention tailored individually to each child, and taking into account the child's strength, emerging skills and weakest skill areas. The main components of the Parent Training are Behavior Modification Techniques, effective Teaching Procedures, Play and Social Skills and the use of Schedules. It is an intensively communication based therapy. ASWB conducts both short parents training for 10 days, advanced Parents Training for 1month and 3months are conducted.

1 Month Parent Training program - 54 families

#### Dikshan

#### **Objectives:**

- To develop communication skill
- To support individuals achieve a wide range of functioning levels.
- Teaching academics.

A school for students with autism. We are not tied to any one doctrine since children with autism typically have uneven patterns of development, resulting in a wide range of functioning levels. Students here receive ABA therapy (Applied Behaviour Analysis) at a 1:1 basis. The emphasis is on developing communication, also we aim to develop independence so we use a lot of structure. The students also work in groups to develop social and leisure skills. This includes schedules and other visuals that help the child to cope. There are 3 sections here:

Junior Section - The individuals here are in the age group of 6 to 13/14 years

Intermediate - The unit help individuals to learn basic academics as well as pre vocational skills.

Beneficiaries: Junior Section- 12 students

Beneficiaries: Intermediate Section - 15 students

#### Aarohan

#### Objectives:

- Providing skill development training
- Developing skills for employment opportunities
- Looking for avenues for employment for young adults.

It is the pre vocational unit for young adults with Autism in the age group from 16 years to 25 years (approx) to learn vocational work as well as academics. The young adults here make note books, jewellery, bags, home décor, greeting cards. Once a week they also prepare food as part of Canteen time. They are also learning non flame cooking. On canteen days, they prepare

maggi, pasta, jhal muri, aloo kabli and different types of sherbaths. Recently baking has been introduced. The trainees have started to prepare cookies and cakes.

Beneficiaries: 8 trainees are undergoing skill development training now.

Dikshan 2

#### **Objectives:**

- Providing classroom teaching for those who are attending school or cannot be accommodated due to lack of availability of seats in the morning session.
- These classes also provide after school support class for individuals.

We have started an afternoon classroom programme for children who attend play school in the morning or who due to some reason can't get admission to our Dikshan school programme (morning). It also caters to the needs of individuals with Autism who stays far off areas.

Beneficiaries: Dikshan 2: 6 students

Intervention

#### **Objectives:**

- To provide continuous support to individuals.
- To provide support for attending mainstream students
- Providing support to outstation individuals who are unable to attend regular classes.

These are short term training programmes where individuals are allotted classes according to their needs for a specific number of days in a week/month for one hour duration. The aim of this programme is to provide support to individuals who are attending mainstream schools or stay outstation where they don't get proper support for their children.

Beneficiaries: 154 individuals

• Young Adult with Autism Reach out (YAAR)

#### **Objectives:**

- Providing a platform to share
- Creating friendships, bonding
- Developing ways of communication with peers.
- Providing a Happy Place

A monthly, social club which enables young individuals with autism to make friends and connect better with the society. Participants are some students of Dikshan, some students with ASD getting mainstream education, employees with ASD, students of colleges and universities. We strongly believe for social inclusion to be a reality people both with and without autism should spend considerable time with each other, getting to know each other.

Participants: 20 to 25 young adults

#### • <u>Diploma in Special Education (Autism)</u>

#### **Objectives:**

Preparing individuals to train and teach individuals with Autism.

Autism Society West Bengal started special D. Ed course approved by Rehabilitation Council of India (RCI) from the academic session 2016-17. The  $1^{\rm st}$  batch started in 2016 with 12 students and 10 of them have been employed by different organizations working in the field of disability. The third batch students will write the exam anytime in this year as the pandemic has pushed the dates to uncertainty. There was 100% success rate in the final examinations for both  $1^{\rm st}$  &  $2^{\rm nd}$  batch of students.

Successful candidates: 18 students have completed D. Ed in ASD from ASWB (from 2 batches)

#### Workshops/Seminars

#### **Objectives:**

- To share the knowledge
- To reach out to more people in the society who might be in need of the services.
- Creating awareness

Autism Society West Bengal believes in empowering individuals. They can be parents, professionals, family members, and people in the community. This empowerment comes from sharing ideas, opinions as well as providing hands on training. Since its beginning, we have been organizing as well as attending different workshops in Kolkata, Delhi, Shillong, Hyderabad, Bangladesh, USA, Mumbai etc. We also believe through these workshops and seminars we can reach out to a wider population which is not always possible through therapy classes. Every year we reach out to 500 to 1000 approx people through such workshops. We believe it's equally important to organize as well as to attend workshops and seminars so as to keep ourselves updated. Professionals from ASWB are invited to be resource persons at various seminars and conferences.

The discussion focused on importance of Vision in the Education and lives of Students along with eye check up for all.
- G. A free dental check camp was organized in association with Guru Nanak Institute of Dental Science and Research, Kolkata. Dr Prof Shabnam Zaheer Professor, Department of Pedodontics, Guru Nanak Institute of Dental Science and Research, Kolkata along with her students came to our campus for dental check and also had an interactive session with parents about maintaining oral health and hygiene.

These sessions provide a platform for professionals and parents to update their knowledge about Autism and also to learn ways to improve their teaching techniques.

#### Outreach Program

#### **Objectives:**

- To share the knowledge
- To reach out to more people in the society who might be in need of the services.
- Creating awareness

Autism Society West Bengal also started outreach programs at Jhargram and Najat(South 24 Paraganas).

Resources persons Mr Pranabesh Bhunia and Mr Binay Samanta visted Jhargram Autism Society to conduct an initial screening for Autism. Professionals and parents attended the two day session where our special educators from ASWB suggested and discussed ways to develop their communication method with the individuals. Jhargram Autism Society is a parent initiated organization started by parents who took training at ASWB.

Autism Society West Bengal also tied up with Institute for Handicapped and Backward People to provide support at their resource cum training centre situated at Najat.

• Occupational Therapy Unit

#### **Objectives:**

- Resolving sensory issues.
- Developing better motor coordination
- Strengthening muscles

Occupational Therapy is an important therapy for Individuals with Autism. Occupational therapy (OT) works in the area of cognitive, physical, social skills. It does this by focusing on sensory integration therapy and enhancement of motor skills. The goal is to improve everyday skills which allow people to become more independent and participate in a wide range of activities. The therapy helps to improve the quality of life for individual with Autism as it helps them to function more independently. Our Occupational therapy unit caters to Individuals with Autism from our organization as well as those who are attending other schools.

**Beneficiaries: 104 individuals** 

• Job Skill Training Program

#### Objective:

- To support individuals to develop skills which will be useful in getting employment
- To teach them soft skills which are very essential for job

Job Skills training are very important for individuals with Autism to get engaged in gainful employment. Individuals with Autism have some difficulty in communication. Teaching them job skill training will help the individuals to overcome the difficulty that they face while interacting or communicating in a work place. It also provides a guideline for work place behaviour.

**Beneficiaries:** 6 individuals with Autism are being trained now as part of job skill training programme.

#### Regular extra curricular activities in ASWB.

#### **Objective**: At ASWB care is taken that all students have a rich typical school experience.

All extra-curricular activities and cultural programs are arranged in school.

Every week a shop is set up with actual snack items. Students actually buy from the stalls during recess. Classroom assistant Babu Patra is in charge of this event lovingly called 'Babuda r Dokan.' Students get a hands on experience in handling money. Of course monetary issues are a part of their curriculum. The Aarohan trainees take part in the selling process and also keep count of the money earned under the guidance of the special educators.

Every month a movie is screened in the Main hall for all the students and trainees.

Summer camp is held with fun activities.

Students take part in inter school cultural events.

Students are taken to do their shoppingduring the Autism Quiet Hour at Big Bazaar on a rotation basis.

Beneficiaries: All students of Dikshan unit and trainees of Aarohan units

### New programs and extra-curricular activities introduced in ASWB.

During 2019-2020 one month parent parenting course was introduced which included group OT. Skating and yoga classes were arranged for students of Dikshan and trainees of Aarohan. Afternoon respite started.

Beneficiaries: Yoga for all students of Dikshan unit and trainees of Aarohan units

Skating was only for those who opted for this on a monthly payment basis.

Afternoon respite started small with 3 students.

# <u>Proving a supported working environment for all employees but especially for those on the spectrum</u>

ASWB firmly believes in providing a supportive environment for all employees. Care is taken to provide reasonable accommodation s to our two employees who are on the spectrum. We also provide new opportunities so our employees may discover their latent interest.

This year our Classroom Assistant, Amitava Basu actively participated in the Orientation Program of the Parent Training unit at Lake Gardens unit. He also started taking Environmental

Science classes in the VBA unit. Office assistant Amitesh Das had been entrusted with additional duty are Library assistant.

Beneficiaries: 2 employees.

Mentaid organized a workshop on specific learning disability. Ms Sonu Mehmi attended the workshop from Autism Society West Bengal.




## MAY, 2019





Even though he is a non verbal child but after the training program he has started to speak two or three meaningful words.' Moreover, she feels that the program has brought her closer to her son now. Now her main priority is child's mainstreaming into the society and to make this world a better place for him Sangeeta is all praise for the therapists at ASWB as they provided proper guidance to her and her child. The therapists also gave encouragement to her so that she feels confident now to face all the challenges ahead.

#### Turna Routh – "I have got positive energy now" - Three Months parent training program

Aneesh got enrolled at Dikshan 2 in the month of November 2019. After joining the classes, Aneesh 's improvement was quiet visible. We wanted him to continue the programs run by ASWB as earlier 10 days and three months intervention program were so much helpful for Aneesh. He is now enjoying the online classes started by ASWB since April because of the lockdown caused by Pandemic. He can now speak few words and can identify things. I am very happy with the training program and thankful to all the teachers and counselors at Autism Society West Bengal.

After completing a six-week VBA programme at Lake Gardens, we noticed so many positive changes in Sayak that we decided to go for another three-month training at the centre. And at the end of three months, we couldn't be more happy about my decision.

While Sayak had already learnt to respond well to his name, take instructions and follow the sequence of events that took place in the class, at the end of three months these responses have now become sharper. The following are the new and positive changes I am noticing in Sayak now:

- i) Use of sign language: The use of sign language has now become more regular and accurate. He can now clearly show his needs through signs while asking to go to toilet and wanting water.
- ii) Pointing and verbalising: Sayak has started verbalising. He mostly says one words but those are meaningful and need-based. He points, says the word, and demands. Hence, his ability to communicate has improved massively and is very assuring for us. This will certainly help him to express himself in a formal school environment.
- iii) Interest in academics: Sayak has started taking a lot of interest in academics. He knows alphabets, numbers and even a few sight words. His interest in letters is also helping him in increasing his vocabulary.
- iv) Better cognitive skills and understanding: Sayak is now better aware of his environment and is better able to understand what is being said to him. It's gradually becoming easier to talk to him, make him understand the dos and don'ts and adapt better to the environment. Overall, it's now become easier to communicate with him.

Area of improvement: The fun quotient of being a child can be worked upon.

After VBA, we can now hope that Sayak is in a position to get integrated into a mainstream school. VBA has been a big learning experience not only for Sayak but also for the parents. It has brought about a big change in our lives and the way we interact with our kids.
